Idioms are one of the more elusive parts of figurative languages. This is because idioms are made from other figurative language techniques (as similar to similar, metaphor or exaggeration). For example, let's look at the idioms he's starting to get on steam. This is a metaphor that compares him to a steam engine, but it is also an idiom. What distinguishes idioms from other figurative language techniques is that people use idioms a lot. In other words, idioms are just clichéd figurative expressions. To complicate matters, students have not been exposed to many of these dated expressions. Most Most today's students do not understand the origin of the phrase hang up the phone yet alone idiom bought the farm. The best way to prepare students is to expose them to a wide range of idioms.
